


# How to Find Job Sponsorship in Australia (Extract I)

This document is a step-by-step guide to finding employer sponsorship in Australia, based on years of research, applying various strategies for job sponsorship on behalf of clients and conducting many case studies of people who successfully found job sponsorship in Australia.

## MODULE ONE: DO YOU QUALIFY FOR EMPLOYER SPONSORSHIP IN AUSTRALIA?

Many people spend months applying for jobs with employer sponsorship, only to discover down the track that they do not actually qualify for sponsorship. This can be heart breaking after spending months searching and putting loads of energy and time into the task of finding employer sponsorship.

Some people believe that if they do not qualify for General Skilled Migration, that their only option is employer sponsorship or 457 visas sponsorship. While this is true in some cases, in many cases, people do not even qualify for this type of visa.

**Our advice: do not start your search for jobs with employer sponsorship until you know that you qualify.**

### TYPES OF EMPLOYER SPONSORSHIP

There are two types of employer sponsorship in Australia – Skilled Workers Temporary; which includes:

- 457 Visas (standard business sponsorship)
- Labour Agreements
- Service Sellers

And Skilled Workers Permanent Visas, including:

- Employer Nomination Scheme (ENS 186)
- Regional Sponsored Migration Scheme (RSMS 187)

There is also a new program, called Expression of Interest (EOI), which is submitted via the online SkillSelect service. More on this shortly.

Australian immigration rules are changing regularly, so we recommend that you keep up to date with what's happening with Australian sponsorship visas, at the Australian Immigration website: <http://www.immi.gov.au/> .

Many people do not understand the main differences between the types of visas, and as such, do not want to be considered for temporary sponsorship visas. This is an error. The reason being, many companies in Australia prefer temporary sponsorship due to the lower risk factor, that being that if the sponsored employee does not work out, the company is not obliged to keep them employed past their visa expiration date. In comparison, although the permanent visa is more attractive to the person being sponsored, the employer will take a big risk to hire someone on a permanent basis whom they have often never met before, nor seen perform in the workplace.

Further, the rules for permanent sponsorship visas are much stricter than for temporary visas; and more often than not, you will not qualify for the permanent visa. Sometimes, you may not qualify for either – it is best to find out (more on this shortly).

Therefore, we urge you to consider temporary visa sponsorship, because even though the risk is greater at your end; being that if the company does not sponsor your PR you will need to find another employer sponsor or leave the country; you will more likely have the opportunity to migrate to Australia on a temporary visa as permanent sponsorship is almost impossible to find.

## HOW DO I FIND OUT IF I QUALIFY FOR EMPLOYER SPONSORSHIP?

There are a two ways that you can uncover whether you do indeed qualify for employer sponsorship in Australia:

- Take a professional assessment with a registered migration agent
- Do your own research using the Australian immigration websites

Many people opt to do their own research; however, if they are not thorough enough in their research, they may make an error in their self-assessment, and find out in the last hour that all their time and efforts have been in vain.

We therefore recommend that you take a professional migration assessment to receive an accurate assessment of your options.

## TAKE A PROFESSIONAL MIGRATION ASSESSMENT

The safest way to discover whether you qualify for employer sponsorship in Australia, and to avoid an incorrect 'diagnosis', is to have a professional assessment with a registered and knowledgeable migration agent.

The reason this is more effective is because they are trained, qualified and experienced in assessing overseas nationals to determine whether you qualify for all the kinds of visas (there are more than 100 types of visas for Australia!). Registered migration agents also are up to date on all the changes and rules that seem to occur on a regular basis these days.

Be careful when selecting a migration agent to use, as there are many agents out there who claim to be migration agents, however, they are not qualified and/or registered with the Australian Department of Immigration. It is important to always check that the migration agent you select is registered. You can check at <http://www.Mara.gov.au> (Migration Agents Registration Authority). To look up your agent, simply click on "Find an Agent", and enter the agent's Name and location, and if you have it you can also enter their business name for a more refined search.
